#### SECTION B: The organisation's mission and vision.

#### Vision

Promoting a positive culture of learning and strengthening the value of education and attendance for children at risk of school disengagement through school, home and community-based preventative and restorative initiatives.

To accomplish the vision, the organisation runs three programmes:

• **School2Home** to provide school-and home-based support for learners with early warning signs of an increased risk of school disengagement and to promote learner and parental/household engagement in the education of the child.



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- Love2Learn to promote a culture of learning and strengthen the value of education and attendance through child and primary caregiver participation, youth activation and community collaboration.
- Child Well-being Service to support vulnerable children through preventative interventions and collaboration with the aim to reduce risk of significant harm that impacts their safety, school engagement and well-being.

#### Programmes

Due to the global COVID-19 pandemic and because of the South African lock-down rules, the organisation was forced to rethink and reimagine the objective and programmes of the organisation. The programmes can be described as follows:

#### Programme School2Home

(Previously: In-School Support)

#### Description

- The focus of the programme is addressing developmental delays, providing emotional support and being the link between school and home in terms of primary caregiver engagement in the education support plan of the learner.
- The cohort for this programme is grade R to grade 4 learners.
- The referral criteria include the progression and retention status of a learner, school attendance, insufficient academic progress, learning difficulties other social factors impacting and school disengagement.

Love2Learn

(Previously: Primary Caregivers & SAGo2School)

The programme has three focus areas: · Community activation & awareness which is an

- asset-based community mobilisation approach, @home learning and youth activation through internship of unemployed youth
- Networking. collaboration and activation of community stakeholders through child participation, community and school-based campaigns and identifying community assets to strengthen and build the community on these foundations
- Primary caregiver engagement by providing healing spaces through storytelling, @home learning assistance, home support guidance, empowerment and skills development.
- **Child Well-being Services**

(Previously: Reintegration of children)

- The focus of this programme is to assess the comprehensive needs and risks of children referred to this service by the School2Home and Love2Learn programmes.
- This preventative, therapeutic and pre-statutory service follow a holistic approach, doing



multidisciplinary work in collaboration with Designated Child Protection Organisations as well as other NGO's providing support services outside Khula's scope of practice.
