Present Primary Caregivers Raise Happy Children

Lynn Abrahams* is a single 43-year old mother of five daughters. I ask Lynn to tell me more about herself. She looks at me, pauses for a while and then says "I am very proud of my daughter." She is referring to Nicole Abrahams, the nine year old in Grade Three who is enrolled in our Love2Learn programme. This programme supports and empowers primary caregivers like Lynn to provide healing spaces through storytelling, at-home learning assistance, home support guidance, empowerment and skills development.

Anelisa Dyota, one of our Love2Learn Facilitators, works with mother and daughter every Tuesday. She facilitates positive verbalisation between them, with the ultimate goal of strengthening their relationship. Lynn, the mom, openly admits that she did not want to work with KDG because she did not understand the context of the services provided. Six months ago, after numerous failed home visits and turning our staff away, she gave them an opportunity to explain themselves. She finally understood that KDG was there to help her, and she accepted it. Lynn says "I did it for my child".

Although Lynn and her five daughters live on the same premises, they do not live in the same house. She lives in the main house with her sister, while her daughters live in a Nutech house in the backyard. The eldest daughter, Janice Abrahams,* is twenty-five years old and she takes care of the sisters like a mother. Lynn admits that she was not present in her children's upbringing and this could be the reason why there is a missing bond between them.

Nicole came onto our radar because she was facing academic challenges in school, and one of her teachers referred her to our School2Home Programme for academic support. According to her age, she was supposed to be in Grade Four, however lagging academically, she was kept in Grade Three. Unlike other learners enrolled in the School2Home programme, Nicole does not miss out on school. During her assessment, it became apparent that she was struggling to see properly. The School2Home Facilitator took the liberty of making an appointment for an eye test, and

the results showed that she needed glasses. KDG assisted in the matter and Nicole received a pair of glasses. Her academic performance improved noticably when she started wearing her glasses. Lynn mentions that in the past, her daughter Janice, who takes care of Nicole, took her for an eye test, but she never followed through with obtaining a pair of glasses. Things could have been so much different she says. Nicole is on the verge of graduating from our School2Home Programme, however, there is still a lot of work to do in the Love2Learn Programme. Lynn mentions at times, Nicole has a bit of a temper.

Anelisa says during their scheduled sessions, both Lynn and Nicole participate and interact with each other. One of the highlights for Lynn is, that while participating in games during home visits, she learned that her daughter loves playing. A highlight for Nicole is making her own stress ball. She can squeeze it whenever she feels overwhelmed. This tool also helps with sensory stimulation.

After working together for the past six months, there is a definite improvement in communication between mother and daughter. This creates a foundation for building a strong relationship and bond with each other. In the past, Lynn was not active in her daughter's life. Today, whenever she is off from work, she makes an effort to walk her daughter home from school. This makes her daughter feel loved and cared for. Our Love2Learn team will continue rendering services to Lynn and Nicole with the ultimate goal of creating a strong, sustainable bond and relationship between mother and daughter.

Basic training in PREVENTING school dropout



At least 40% of learners drop out of school before reaching Grade 12 in South Africa. In addressing this issue, KDG presented Basic Training in Preventing School Dropout to over 100 Primary School Teachers and ECD Practitioners in the Cape Winelands area in August 2023. This forms part of The Tracking Children Project, a collaboration between Khula Development Group, Inceba Trust, and the Western Cape Education Department.

Prayer WEEK We celebrated prayer week during 21 August to 1 September 2023.

During this period, our staff and volunteers were active in schools for group and individual sessions. Little hearts opened up, and out of their own will, learners came in need with numerous prayer requests. Prayer boxes were also provided for those who did not have the courage to ask for prayer. These boxes were filled with prayer requests relating to unemployment, abuse, safety, loadshedding, relationships, household circumstances, sickness, disease, and bullying.

Teachers also participated and some came with heavy hearts. One with over 18 years' experience was in tears and close to quitting due to illdiscipline in class. Khula staff prayed with her and a week later she was in good spirits, thanking Khula for their prayers which helped her through a challenging time.

At a school located in a gang riddled community, a teacher came forward with a heavy heart. The previous day, while learners were changing classes, a learner from another school in the area entered her class and attacked a learner. Shocked to the core, all she could do was scream for help. Her cries were heard in time while the learner was making his way off the school premises. The teacher remains concerned as the learner who was



attacked is a potential school dropout. Bullying is known as one of the reasons why learners drop out of school. We remain in prayer for this learner while the school principal handles the situation at school.
