# Almost a dropout, now a MATRICULANT.

"I AM A LIBERAL I CAN DO ANYTHING"! These are the words of Onika Tatsi, a former Khula learner who is now a matriculant at Charleston Hill Secondary School in Paarl. Upon introducing himself, he says "Our generation can change the future of our country, they should remain focused, if only every child had access to Khula". With confidence, he takes me back more than ten years when he moved to Paarl from Khayelitsha.

His first day in Grade 1 at Paarlzicht Primary is not a day Onika likes to remember. Despite the heavy rain and being teased by his peers over wearing one sock, he could not speak a word of Afrikaans. Although he had a difficult year in school, he managed to learn the language and progressed to Grade 2. Unfortunately, Onika's Afrikaans was not up to standard which led to him repeating Grade 2. His mother immediately looked for help and met Eunice Gweba, a neighbour who helped her son with Afrikaans. Onika remembers after school she would play school with him again and have him read prescribed school books, do phonics, and build sentences.

At the start of Grade 3, the informal settlement in which he lived was struck by a blaze and his family lost everything, including his Afrikaans books which he had grown to love. Mr Julies, the school principal helped Onika with a school uniform, and his teacher, Mrs Adams, provided him with new reading books. She took him under her wing to help him develop in the Afrikaans language. Onika looked forward to these reading sessions with her and read with confidence after every meeting they had.

When Onika was in Grade 4 he stepped into a nail and without medical care his wound became infected. This led to him being hospitalized for more than two months. He missed out on schoolwork and had a lot to catch up on. When he returned to school, Khula Development Group was asked to assist him with his academics as he wanted to drop out of school. Marliza Koen, one of our former programme facilitators met with him and encouraged him to stay in school.

When Onika speaks of Marliza his face lights up. During one of their meetings

she told him that he has a purpose and she feels that there is more good in him than he could ever imagine. He smiles when he says she gave him a gift for his birthday and this was when he knew he was special and loved. Suddenly he began looking at life differently. He committed to his schoolwork and was eager to complete school. When he completed primary school, it was bittersweet as he had to say goodbye to Marliza for KDG provides services to primary schools only.

Onika settled into high school and completed Grade 8. During Grade 9, COVID-19 and the lockdown had a huge impact on his schoolwork. Once restrictions were lifted, adjusting to the new school system was challenging, however, he passed and progressed to Grade 10. Through numerous educational community programmes, he had access to additional resources he could use at home to complete his schoolwork.

Through a group of friends Onika met, peer pressure kicked in and he forgot about his dream of completing school. He would miss out on school to spend time with his friends at home or on the street corners. His mother saw a change in his behaviour and contacted the school. She was determined that he should change his ways. Fortunately, he received assistance from community organisations. Onika said goodbye to his friends and once again focused on progressing to matric. At home, he did not have a space where he could study, so the school assisted with a space after school. As a result, he would return home later than his classmates, but he reaped the fruits when he passed Grade 11.

Today Onika is in matric. He wrote his last subject and is anxiously awaiting his results as he applied to study Agriculture at Elsenburg in Stellenbosch. Onika believes that he is breaking the generational curse of not obtaining matric in his family. He takes the conversation back to Marliza and says "She told me I have a purpose, my purpose is to take care and provide for my mother and my siblings". In the final moments of our conversation tears of gratitude roll down his face "If not for Khula, if not for Marliza, I would just be another lost soul on the streets".

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- A male learner enrolled in all three of the programmes at KDG, strives to achieve success, despite the challenges he is facing at home. With two parents addicted to drugs and health issues, our team is working around the clock to get them into rehab. Teachers at the school the learner attends have insight into his circumstances and go the extra mile to ensure he receives a meal and attends school. The learner participates in numerous activities at school and flourishes in cultural activities. With no other family members to take him in, we are exploring alternative care options.
- A brother and sister remained absent from school regularly. Our team had numerous discussions with their mother who was not interested in cooperating to get her children back in school. The learners were later placed in the care of their grandmother who prioritised school attendance. Their teachers report that they are in school regularly and are showing progress in their schoolwork.

## 2 New CLASSROMS for KHULA VAL DE VIE FOUNDATION a better life for all

To render services at primary schools, our organisation needs a classroom dedicated to our School2Home programme. This programme takes place at the school where learners, who are at risk of dropping out of primary school, receive academic support. We understand that although schools require our services, they do not have a space they can dedicate to our mission, as they are already faced with overcrowdedness and too few classrooms.

Lorraine Hadfield, Advisor at the Val de Vie Foundation heard our cries and did not hesitate to lend a helping hand in preventing primary school learners from dropping out of the school system. The foundation hosted a Golf Day in honour of our mission and raised funds to secure classrooms dedicated to KDG.

Within two weeks, two classrooms were built at Paarlzicht Primary School and Orleansvale Primary School situated in Paarl East. Alongside school staff, learners, the community, and most importantly our clients, we stand in awe with gratitude in our hearts toward the Val de Vie Foundation who made our dreams come true.

We are excited to start 2024 in our own classrooms, keeping learners in school!
